Introduction

The City of Airdrie engaged GEC Architecture and HarGroup Management Consultants to conduct a recreation facility needs assessment study to help inform the development of indoor and outdoor amenities within the community.

The purpose of the project is:

To garner broad public input about the needs and preferences for future indoor and outdoor recreation facilities and to engage key community stakeholders to understand their specific needs.

The results of the needs assessment will inform City Council about the broadest expression of needs and priorities for recreation facilities in Airdrie.

This document presents a summary of information and data gathered for the recreation facility needs assessment study. It is intended to provide base information that can be used to develop strategies and recommendations for new recreation facilities in Airdrie. Its purpose is to foster discussion about facility needs within the community.

Public engagement for the Needs Assessment Study involved quantitative surveys with Airdrie residents and recreation service providers. The intent of these processes was to attain objective, dependable, and evidentiary information about Airdrie community needs. Data gathered from these surveys will be used to quantify behaviours, opinions, and expectations that enable generalized inferences to the larger population of Airdrie.

Components of this document include:

- A profile of population characteristics for Airdrie including demographic information and historical population trends.
- The findings of an inventory of recreation facilities in Airdrie and a comparative review of facilities situated in six Canadian cities that comprise similar demographic profiles to Airdrie.
- The results of Community Surveys conducted with residents of Airdrie, which included:
 - A random sample survey to gather statistically reliable data that is representative of residents' perspectives from the community as a whole.
 - An open engagement survey to enable all interested residents an opportunity to provide input to the Needs Assessment process.
- The results of a survey conducted with recreation service providers.
- Review of various municipal documents such as:
 - 2019 Municipal Census
 - Artificial Turf Sportsfield Feasibility Study (2021)
 - Great Places Plan
 - Sport Field Management Plan (2021)
 - Youth Needs Assessment Study (2016)
 - Youth Engagement Strategy Framework (2019)




Airdrie Population Profile

Airdrie has a population with distinctive characteristics that differentiates it from many other communities.

 It has less diversity in terms of immigrants and visible minorities, which can influence recreation interests and activities among the population. Other demographic data that are available suggest that many residents have moved to Airdrie from other Alberta communities.

- There is higher home ownership and household incomes, possibly allowing for more disposable income to be available for recreation pursuits among residents.
- Average household sizes are larger, and the population is younger, including almost a third being under 20 years of age, which impacts recreation behaviours and patterns within the community.





Average household size



Average age






Median household income






under 20 years of age (%)


Over the past two decades, Airdrie has experienced significant population growth; more so than most other communities, especially when the growth rate of Canada as a whole is considered.

Based on analysis of age distributions within the population during this period, it appears that the community has attracted new residents from various age groups. However, most notably among younger adults aged 25 to 44 years who have moved to Airdrie with children or established a family after moving to the community.

The growing older adult and senior population may also suggest that existing residents are choosing to remain in Airdrie through retirement.

As will be seen in the data presented in the next sections, the population growth has created deficits in terms of recreation facilities and, should it continue, will create additional gaps that will need to be addressed. The characteristics of the population presented in this profile will influence needs and priorities for facility development.

Recreation Facilities in Airdrie

Throughout Airdrie, there are various indoor and outdoor recreation facilities. Inventory summaries of key recreation facilities are presented to the right and on the next page. In addition to these facilities, there are neighbourhood parks, playgrounds, pathways and trails, and sport fields within the community.

Genesis Place is a hub of recreation activity within Airdrie. Residents can participate in various activities and programs in the Aquatic Centre, ice rinks, indoor turf fields, gymnasium, Fitness Centre, indoor playground, gymnastics facility, as well as multiple program and meeting rooms.

The community's premier outdoor rectangular sports field facility, Ed Eggerer Athletic Park, is located at Genesis Place with a full-sized rectangular field that can be used for multiple sports such as football, soccer, lacrosse, and field hockey. There is a 1,000 seat grandstand, as well as press box, and scoreboard and clock. Athletic track and field amenities such as a 400m, 8 lane, running track and jump pits are also located at the facility. It is used by a variety of sport user groups within Airdrie, as well as for varsity activities of local high schools.

Chinook Winds Regional Park provides premier sport opportunities with 8 diamonds within 2 quad amenities for baseball, softball, fastball, and slo-pitch. The Park also has beach volleyball, a splash park, skate park and other recreation amenities.

Other key facilities in the community include Bert Church Theatre (377 seat performance facility), Airdrie Public Library, Town & Country Centre (hall, rooms, curling club, seniors centre), and Nose Creek Valley Museum.

Use of Recreation Facilities

User and financial statistics were gathered to provide insights into use of City of Airdrie recreation facilities among Airdronians.


A sample of hours was drawn from use during Prime Time Hours at the Genesis Place Aquatic Centre and Fieldhouse, and all indoor boarded ice arenas during November 2019. The results show that the Aquatic Centre at Genesis Place and all community arenas were at or close to capacity of available Prime Time hours. Fields in the Genesis Place Fieldhouse were also highly used during Prime Time, especially Field 1 which has synthetic turf flooring.

Data from 2019 show that passholder visitations (85%) was significantly higher than drop in admission visitations (15%) among use of the Genesis Place Aquatic Centre, Fitness Centre, Fun Place, as well as general public admittance to the Fieldhouse, Arenas, and other areas. These findings reveal the importance of selling passes to Airdrie residents for Genesis Place.


In terms of monthly visitation from Passholders and Drop In Admission to Genesis Place in 2019, there were higher visits at the beginning of the year, which declined slightly between June and September and increased again for the rest of the year. Based on this information, it might be suggested that the utilization sample shown above for the Aquatic Centre in November 2019 is representative of use throughout most of the year for this particular amenity during Prime Time hours.

Distribution of Monthly Visitation to Genesis Place in 2019 (Passes and Drop In)




Further analysis of Pass Sales and Drop In Admission visits provides additional learnings about use of Genesis Place. Overall, the data suggest Genesis Place is used by Airdronians of all ages.


- Families and children and youth represent a significant segment of users based on the number of Family Pass sales and Family, Preschool, Child, and Youth Admission visits during 2019. This pattern would reflect the high proportion of the population that is under 20 years of age in the community.
- Adults are also a segment of import as Adult Pass Sales and Adult Admission visits were also high for Genesis Place in that year.
- Seniors were a further noteworthy segment, mainly based on the Pass Sales.

Analysis of Program Registrations reveals that Airdronians were the primary registrants (83%) for programs offered at Genesis Place in 2019. While these data cannot be extrapolated to Pass and Drop In Admission or user group visitations, they may imply the general use of Airdrie residents among users of the facility.


Distribution of Pass Sales by Type in 2019 - 3,181 Total

Responses gathered from the service provider survey about program participation, along with rental information and desk research was used to estimate the numbers of user group participants that use different categories of indoor and outdoor City of Airdrie facilities. These data are presented in the table to the right along with rental hours

at facilities and revenues obtained by the
rentals. Boarded ice rinks has the highest
estimate of participants, as well as revenues
from facility use.

Revenues from various sources for indoor facilities of the City of Airdrie were approximately \$6 million in 2019. Just over a third of the revenue was derived from Drop In Admissions and Pass Sales (37%). About a quarter of revenues came from aquatics program and rental revenues (23%) and another quarter from ice arena rental revenues (25%). The remaining revenues (about 15%) were received from fitness centre programs and rentals of gymnasiums, indoor fields, studios, rooms and running track.

Comparative Review of **Similar Communities**

An inventory of indoor and outdoor recreation facilities in Airdrie was conducted, along with a comparative review of facilities located in similar communities.

The purpose of the comparative review is to provide a broader perspective of recreation facility development by considering how other municipalities have organized recreation infrastructure to meet residents' needs.

To choose the communities to include in the comparative review, the following process was undertaken:

- Demographic data were gathered to identify communities that have similar characteristics to Airdrie. Some latitude was considered in the selection process given the distinctive profile of the Airdrie population (see Appendices for demographic characteristics considered).
- Communities considered within the selection process needed to have population sizes of between 60,000 and 150,000. The range enabled consideration of existing and future needs for Airdrie. It should be noted that based on the Airdrie Municipal Census of 2019, the community has a population of over 70,000.

Residents' Engagement

Airdrie residents were engaged through community surveys to gain information about needs and expectations for recreation within the community.

- HarGroup consultants designed survey instruments that were reviewed by City of Airdrie representatives prior to fielding.
 The questionnaire was organized to gather detailed quantitative data about involvement in recreation activities, expected needs for indoor and outdoor facilities, and other issues related to recreation facilities in the community.
- The surveys were fielded between October 20 and November 30, 2021.
- The surveys involved questions about household members' behaviours, opinions, and interests. Respondents were asked to have one adult member respond to the survey questions on behalf of the household. Since the questions asked about issues related to all members in the household (including children/youth), it is more likely that an adult member of the household will have the capacity to answer the questions (compared to children or youth within the household).
- Incentives of three \$100 gift cards were used to encourage participation in the survey.

All resident households were given an opportunity to participate in an open-link online survey, which is termed Open Engage within this document. An additional survey process was conducted with a random sample of resident households and is referred to as Random Invite.

Survey Specifications:

Random Invite Survey

- The City of Airdrie provided mailing addresses for 25,926 households.
- A sample of 3,800 was randomly selected from the available addresses to be sent paper questionnaire packages (Note: 60 packages were returned after the mailing and identified by Canada Post as 'no such address').
- Questionnaire packages included an introduction letter, questionnaires, a self-addressed postage paid envelope, and a prize draw entry form card.
- Respondent households were given the opportunity to complete the paper questionnaire or access an online form to complete it.
- A total of 476 completed questionnaires were returned (221 by mail and 255 online). The completed questionnaires represented a 13% response rate.
- Typically, a randomized survey consisting of 476 completed interviews for a population the size of Airdrie would provide margin of error of ±5 within a 95% confidence interval.

Open Engage Survey

- An open-link online questionnaire was available to residents to participate in the survey process.
- Residents could access the online form through the City of Airdrie website.
- The survey was promoted through City of Airdrie social media and street signs.
- A total of 880 resident households completed the open-link online form.

Public engagement can involve various methods to solicit information from residents. For this Needs Assessment Study, quantitative survey methods were used. Obtaining measurements of behaviour, opinions, and interests can enhance understanding of the community's response to issues of import for the decisions that will result from the engagement findings.

The Open Engage Survey allows all residents an opportunity to provide their input into the engagement process. The findings of the Open Engage Survey are presented in this report and help to inform the issues that were examined.

Employing a randomized sampling survey within the process was deemed important to ensure that there would be objective, dependable, and evidentiary information available within the engagement process. The randomized sampling process helps to eliminate systematic bias that can occur in survey results. This is particularly important with surveys about recreation as there may be population segments that have vested interests in the results, which may encourage participation in open engagement processes. Should this occur, there is the possibility of over representativeness of certain interests in the survey findings. The randomized sampling process helps to minimize this type of systematic bias.

The surveys were fielded during the Covid-19 pandemic. It was acknowledged that recreation activities among residents were affected by the pandemic. As such, respondents were asked to respond based on recreation involvement from 2019 through 2021. This approach was used in an attempt to compensate for potential affects of the pandemic.



Demographic Characteristics

Various demographic characteristics were included within the community surveys to determine representativeness of the samples and assist in understanding perspectives among segments of the Airdrie population.

Overall, the sample from the Random Invite Survey appears to be more representative of the household population within Airdrie than the Open Engage Survey. Even so, there are a few segments of the population that are underrepresented, such as households that rent their homes.

Location

Respondents were asked to identify the community in which they reside. The data gathered in the surveys were compared to the results of the 2019 Municipal Census. A summary is presented to the right.


To enable useful analysis of respondents' location within Airdrie, communities were organized into northwest, southwest, and east areas.


- Distribution for the Random Invite Survey was similar to the results of the 2019 Municipal Census.
- The Open Engage Survey had fairly similar distribution to that of the 2019 Municipal Census but was influenced by respondents who lived outside of Airdrie (e.g., Rocky View County, Calgary, and towns and villages surrounding Airdrie.)

Gender


Gender distribution among members of households respondents were fairly consistent with the 2016 Federal Census. In both the Random Invite and Open Engage Surveys, some household members were identified as Other; however, the number of responses were small.


Age, Household Composition, and Family Life Stage

Differences between the 2019 Municipal Census and survey distributions are apparent; particularly for the Open Engage Survey.


- Differences observed among age groups within the Random Invite Survey are all relatively small (such as up to ±3%).
- The Open Engage Survey has more notable differences, especially with the 10 to 14 age group (+9% disparity).
- This difference, as well as those for the 5 to 9 and 15 to 19 age groups, influences the distribution of household composition for the Open Engage Survey.

Data from these characteristics were used to organize the survey samples into family life stages. The concept of family life stages is that most families progress through a number of distinct phases throughout their existence and distinctions are apparent for recreation activities and interests within different stages (see Appendices for definitions of family life stages). Comparing the results of the two surveys reveals that there is a significantly higher representation of Early Nest and Nest with Youth households within the Open Engage sample.


Age Distribution

Commute to Calgary


Most respondents indicated that household members commute to Calgary (in 2019/20/21) on a daily basis to go to work, school, or some other purpose.

Fitness/Recreation Centre Memberships

Most respondents indicated that at least one household member had a membership at a fitness/recreation centre in 2019/20/21. The prevalence of fitness centre/recreation centre memberships was much more prominent for the Open Engage sample.


Just over a third of Random Invite respondents indicated that someone in their household had a membership at Genesis Place during 2019/20/21. Genesis Place offers various types of memberships and passes such as punch cards and monthly, annual, or continuous passes. To provide some context to these proportions, between the beginning of 2019 and mid 2021, there were over 10,000 unique client passes purchased to gain access to Genesis Place.

Housing Tenure





General Perceptions about Recreation

Several questions were asked of respondents about general issues associated with recreation. In some respects, these issues provide context to the relevance of recreation in the lives of respondents.

The first of these questions asked about the importance of recreation to the quality of life of household members. To this query, the vast majority of respondents concurred. Indeed, almost three-quarters of Random Invite respondents strongly agreed that recreation was important to members' quality of life.


Most respondents also agreed that household members are aware of the types of facilities and programs that are available in Airdrie. However, the extent of agreement was much less convincing for this statement. Only a third of Random Invite respondents indicated that they strongly agreed of knowing what is available.

A further statement asked about the possibility of household members being more involved in activities if additional recreation facilities were to be developed in Airdrie. Again, most respondents agreed, and just over a third stated that they strongly agreed to the assertion.


Detailed analysis reveals that Early Nest, Nest with Youth, and Late Nest households are more likely to agree that recreation is important to quality of life and household members would be more involved in activities if more recreation facilities were developed in Airdrie (see Appendices for tables).

Perceptions of Recreation


Recreation is important to the quality of life of members of your household

If more recreation facilities were developed in Airdrie, your household members would be more involved in activities (based on pre-Covid pandemic involvement)




(Question C2)

Satisfaction with aspects of the recreation services in Airdrie were examined with respondents. For the most part, respondents expressed satisfaction with these issues. Even so, more than one in four respondents expressed dissatisfaction with the variety and affordability of recreation facilities and programs. Further, more than one in three respondents indicated dissatisfaction with the location of facilities and programs.

It is worth noting that respondents located in northwest and southwest Airdrie were significantly less likely to indicate satisfaction with the location of recreation facilities and programs than respondents in east Airdrie.

Recreation Activities

Residents were asked various questions to understand their recreation behaviours and involvement.

Perceived Activity Levels

Most respondent households perceive themselves to be either very or somewhat active in recreation. Respondents to the Open Engage Survey were much more likely to consider themselves to be very active in recreation.


Younger respondent households, particularly those with children and youth, are much more likely to perceive members of their households to be very or somewhat active (see Appendices). This is an important distinction as households with children and youth will commonly have their activities concentrated around the interests of the younger members of the household.

Types and Locations of Activities

Detailed data about types and locations of activities are presented over the next few pages. A few key observations from the data include:

- Top activities (all, organized, unorganized, competition) involve various indoor and outdoor recreation amenities (e.g., park, sport field, aquatic, ice, indoor turf, and hard surface).
- Top activities for which Airdrie residents go outside the community involve cultural interests, outdoor pursuits, activities that lack amenities in Airdrie, or competitions scheduled with non-Airdrie teams.
- Most of the top activities (Of All Activities) among Airdrie respondents are unorganized such as walking, jogging or running, going to a park, swimming, fitness training, going to the library, etc.

Activities Wanted to Do More Often


Approximately half of respondents indicated that household members would have liked to do some activities more often than they were able to in 2019.

The most common activities they would have preferred to do more often included:

- Swimming (RI 17%; OE 17%)
- Fitness exercise instruction (RI 10%; OE 4%)
- Fitness training (RI 9%; OE 6%)
- Gymnastics (RI 6%; OE 4%)
- Dance (RI 6%; OE 2%)

Many of the reasons for wanting to participate more were access related such as not enough available, current offerings being full, the right kinds of opportunities not being available.)


Almost half of respondents indicated that household members would like to start new activities (that they did not take part in during 2019/20/21).

The most common activities cited for starting included:

- Swimming (RI 12%; OE 10%)
- Pickleball (RI 9%; OE 5%)
- Martial arts (RI 7%; OE 4%)
- Dance (RI 7%; OE 3%)
- Fitness training (RI 7%; OE 7%)
- Fitness movement/stretching (instruction) (RI - 6%; OE - 4%)
- Fitness exercise instruction (RI 6%; OE -4%)

Again, many of the reasons for not having already started participating in the activities were related to access and perceived cost.

Activities Likely to Stop or Do Differently Due to Pandemic


About one in four Random Invite respondents stated that household members were likely to stop recreation activities, do less, or do differently due to the pandemic.

The most common activities cited for stopping, doing less, or doing differently included:

- Fitness training (RI 35%; OE 31%)
- Fitness exercise instruction (RI 10%; OE -8%)
- Swimming (general) (RI 6%; OE 10%)
- Swimming lessons (RI 6%; OE 2%)
- Martial arts (RI 6%; OE 3%)

Common reasons for indicating change in participation included having purchased equipment, concerned about being in facilities with other people, and having starting different activities.

Facility Use

There are various recreation facilities available where Airdrie residents can engage in activities and pursuits. Many exist in Airdrie, while others are available outside the community.

Data presented on the next page shows use among survey respondents of various recreation amenities located in Airdrie, Calgary, Rocky View County, and Crossfield, Beiseker, and Irricana from 2019 through 2021.

These results reveal the importance of recreation facilities being located in Airdrie. Overall, use of Airdrie facilities is much more prevalent than use of facilities outside the community. For example, about three in ten Random Invite respondents indicated attendance at Bert Church Theatre, which is higher than the one in five respondents that stated use of performing arts facilities in Calgary. This particular example is highlighted as there are many more of these facilities located in Calgary, and yet the survey findings suggests that Airdronians are more likely to attend events at Bert Church Theatre than in Calgary.

The findings also show the prevalence of use of pathways and trails, parks, aquatic facilities, the public library, and playgrounds within Airdrie. These amenities typically support unorganized (or unstructured) activities.

Community halls, ice rinks, diamonds and rectangular sport fields, and indoor fields, which primarily support organized activities, are also used by substantial portions of residents.

Development Priorities

Based on the following ratings, respondents indicated that all age segments of the population and different participation levels should be given similar priorities for developing more recreation facilities and programs.

Advanced level activities received the least support among all the options. Even so, eight in ten respondents stated it was important for the needs of this segment to have facilities and programs developed.

Recreation Facility Development


The survey asked a series of questions about indoor and outdoor recreation facility development to identify perceived needs and expectations among residents.

A question asked about the relevance of facility development to members of respondents' households. Approximately half

of Random Invite and a higher proportion of Open Engage respondents indicated that it was very important to their households that additional recreation facilities were developed in Airdrie.

It is worth noting that Early Nest and Nest with Youth households were significantly more likely to state that it was important to their households that additional recreation facilities are developed (see Appendices for tables).

Relevance of Recreation Facility Development in Airdrie



Most respondents agreed that new facilities should emphasize users/ attendees/tournaments from outside the community even though there may be additional costs to do so; although most of these respondents stated somewhat rather than strongly agree to the assertion.

Respondents were also asked to indicate whether household members would use a new regional park in northeast Airdrie and a new multipurpose (indoor and outdoor) facility in west south Airdrie.


Respondents were much more likely to agree that they would use a new recreation facility on the west south part of Airdrie.

Respondents located in east Airdrie were significantly more likely to agree to use of a regional park in northeast Airdrie, while those in northwest and, particularly, southwest Airdrie would use a new multipurpose recreation facility in west south Airdrie (see Appendices for tables).


Also, respondents who stated that new facilities are very important for their households were more likely to state use of a new regional park and new multipurpose facility.



Perceived Needs for New **Recreation Facilities**

Respondents were asked to identify new indoor and outdoor recreation facilities for Airdrie. There were two opportunities to provide expectations of need.

First, respondents were asked to identify the types of facilities needed within the community with no aided response. Second, respondents were asked to identify new recreation facilities based on distributing \$100 to various types of amenities.

For the unaided response, respondents could indicate that no new facilities are needed. About one in four Random Invite and approximately one in seven Open Engage respondents stated so.

Detailed information showing responses to facility needs are presented on the next few pages. The top ten identified facilities are listed to the right.

Service Provider Engagement

Service providers that offer recreation services to Airdrie residents were invited to participate in an online survey.

- The City of Airdrie provided a list of service providers for the survey.
- Service providers were sent an introduction email by HarGroup Consultants that invited them to participate in the survey.
- Three additional reminder emails were sent to service providers to encourage their participation in the survey.
- Follow-up telephone calls were made to service provider representatives to further encourage participation.
- The questionnaire used for the survey was designed and hosted online by HarGroup Consultants.
- The survey was fielded between November 10 to 30, 2021.
- A total of 37 service providers participated in the survey.*

The survey asked providers about their services, involvement of participants, users, members, and attendees, and perceived needs for recreation facilities.

*Note: A total of 99 organizations were sent emails to participate in the survey. As the fielding process progressed, several organization representatives stated that the survey was not relevant to their services, and some organizations had discontinued operations. Twenty of the online forms were accessed by representatives, but not completed. Contact information was sourced from City of Airdrie databases and desk research.

Profile of Survey Participants

Questions asked service providers about their organization . This section presents a profile of the service providers that participated in the survey.

- Approximately half of service providers identified their organizations as societies (e.g., society, association, club, fellowship, foundation, league, bureau, etc.). The remaining providers were typically nonprofit or private companies, or not officially registered.
- Most service providers indicated that full or part-time staff were employed by their organization. Volunteers were also employed by many of the organizations.
- On average, the service providers had operated for 20 years.
- Most providers indicated being affiliated with National and/or Provincial organizations.
- Average annual expenses for facility use were \$38,000 (median average \$9,000).
- Approximately four in ten service providers indicated providing services all year round. Many providers indicated that they offer services during fall, winter, and spring seasons.



Months Provide Services




Some service providers indicated that their organizations use facilities outside of Airdrie and in Calgary. These organizations primarily use ice rinks, aquatic facilities, and gymnasiums. Reasons indicated for using facilities outside the community included:


- Lack of facilities situated in Airdrie.
- Sport boundaries include communities outside of Airdrie requiring use of facilities outside the city.
- Facilities outside of Airdrie are less expensive to use.
- Facilities outside of Airdrie have features that are needed to serve participants (e.g., aquatic facilities).

Service providers were given an opportunity to identify issues (other than dealing with the Covid pandemic) that their organizations would need to address in the future. The following summaries present the issues identified:

- Lack of facilities (unable to meet future growing demand).
- Increased costs (fees) to use facilities.
- Decrease of external funding being available (e.g., grants, casinos, fund raising, etc.)
- Need to enhance existing facilities.
- Increased competition from other providers.
- Lack of volunteers.








Participation in Programs and Services


Service providers were asked questions about past and future participation in programs and services. Some key observations from these questions include:

- A significant majority of participants, users, members, or attendees are Airdronians.
- Service providers serve participants, users, members, or attendees of all ages, but children and youth represent the majority.
- Most service providers experienced increases in participation levels within their programs in the five years leading up to 2019. The average increase among these service providers was approximately 15%.
- Some organizations experienced declines in participation. There are various reasons for these declines. Most notable include changes in programming provision or organizational structures. For example, new competitive organizations (or leagues) have started, which has affected participation in existing organizations. Another example involves amalgamations that occur among organizations, sometimes located in other communities, that affect participation levels.
- Some organizations indicated that they have had to cap registrations due to lack of facilities, which has limited their opportunities for growth.
- There are organizations that expect more participants in the next full season after the pandemic, but others anticipate fewer.
 Based on those organizations that provided estimates, an overall increase of approximately 2% to 3increase is anticipated from 2019 participation levels.


Residency of Participants, Users, Members, Attendees Served

- About half of the service providers indicated that they foresee their programs and services being different in the future:
 - Expand services and offer different services to address new needs and expectations of participants.
 - Smaller cohorts or groups participating together.
 - Will need time to rebuild their organizations/demand from users.
 - Continuation of providing services online.
 - Fewer spectators.
 - Affects on fees charged (lower fees expected).


Facilities in Airdrie

Perceptions of Facilities

All of the service providers indicated that they use facilities in Airdrie to provide services to Airdronians. For the most part, service providers agree that the facilities are safe for use, in good physical condition and have appropriate equipment required to address their needs.

Quite a few service providers disagreed that existing facilities are adequate to accommodate tournaments for their sport, activities, or programs.


Most stakeholders perceive the need for facilities to address both current and future program and service offerings.

In addition to new facility needs, some stakeholders indicated the need for facility enhancements:

- Curling rink (lounge and spectator areas)
- Football fields (lights and performance field)
- Ice rinks (dressing rooms, general upgrades)
- Outdoor rectangular fields (washrooms, lights)
- Ice rink users expressed concerns about the future of Plainsman arena.
- Indoor soccer users indicated that provincial specifications for the game are changing from boarded to unboarded fields.

Comparative Review Selection Process

- The purpose of the comparative review is to:
 - Select 6 communities that are similar to larger in population to Airdrie.
 - Examine both indoor and outdoor facilities (or amenities) to compare to Airdrie to identify gaps. These gaps would then be used to inform both the recreation centre (SW) and the regional park (NE).
 - Help inform the broader recreation needs assessment of the project.
- Communities throughout Canada were researched to identify those that have populations between 60,000 and 150,000 (based on 2016 Federal Census). A total of 35 communities were identified.
- Data were gathered for these communities based on demographic characteristics (see next pages):
 - Population growth between 2011 and 2016 - %
 - Average age
 - Age under 15 (0 to 14) and under 20 (0 to 19) - %
 - Seniors (aged 65+) %
 - Average household size
 - Immigrant population %
 - Visible minority %
 - Median household income
 - Median household income after taxes

- Demographic characteristics were examined based on statistical analysis involving standard deviation (1st values that lie within one standard deviation of the average compared to Airdrie next page;
 2nd values that lie within two standard deviations of the average compared to Airdrie subsequent page). Based on this analysis, it was determined that Airdrie has a very unique demographic profile to almost all the other communities, particularly related to age distribution. Airdrie has a younger population compared to the vast majority of other communities.
- Priorities for selecting communities were based on the following:
 - Similar demographic characteristics.
 - Priorities given to communities located in 1) Alberta 2) western Canada 3) Canada.
 - Communities that have lower immigrant and visible minority populations.



Family Life Stage Definitions

A series of questions were presented to respondents to enable segmentation of households into family life stage categories.

The family life stage model is based on the concept that most families progress through a number of distinct phases throughout their existence. The key factor used to determine family life stage was household composition (ages of household members). Definitions of the six segments of the family life stage distribution are:

- Young adults (without children/youth)

 the adults are primarily under 45
